Manly United 2
Marconi 1

Manly United leapfrogged both Marconi and Sydney United into fourth position in the NSW Premier League on Sunday, after snatching a priceless 2-1 victory at Marconi stadium.

Golden boot contender Robbie Cattanach slotted home his ninth goal of the season just three minutes from the end of regular time, sealing a much needed victory for the away side.

ROBBIE Cattanach's last-gasp winner has put Manly United in the driver's seat for a finals place, capturing a stunning victory over Marconi Stallions at Marconi Stadium last Sunday.

Caretaker coach Les Macedo was "as happy as a pig in mud" with the come from behind victory.

"It was a very, very tough game, but to come from behind against Marconi at their home ground is fantastic," Macedo said.

"In one week we've gone from the car boot to the driver's seat and I'd much rather be driving the car."

But of the two teams it was Marconi who looked odds on to take all three points.

A brilliant one-two combination between Matthew Gordon and Stefan Donevski set up the Stallion's only goal just eight minutes into the match.

Gordon's incisive give and go saw him open up an angle on the left side of goal where he made no mistake slotting home from just inside the box.

Despite conceding the opening goal in the seventh minute, stand-in captain and goalkeeper Brad Swancott said the team didn't drop their heads.

"We were caught ball-watching a bit for that goal, but it was just one lapse in concentration at the start of the game," said the 28-year-old custodian after his first victory as captain said.

"But as soon as the goal went in, everyone was straight onto their job straight away."

Seven minutes later Marconi's keeper Daniel Nash nearly gifted Manly an equaliser when he swung a leg and all but missed the simplest of back passes.

A collective shriek went around the stadium but

much to his relief the ball trickled harmlessly across the face of goal and out for a corner.

From there on it looked as if the match would be one of those games that are decided in the opening 15 minutes.

Both teams probed the flanks and sent in crosses but no one could get on the end of any deliveries and the game became bogged in midfield.

But after a defensive scrap on the edge of Marconi's area Dusan Mihaljovic found a loose ball at his feet and easily tucked away the equaliser four minutes before the break.

The second half wasn't much brighter and the game looked set for a draw until Robbie Cattanach broke Marconi's offside trap and chased down a long ball on the left flank.

Cattanach made a strong point for the Golden Boot award with a cool finish past the Stallion's keeper.

"The ball came through for me and I just put my head down and started running. I thought I'd pushed it too far ahead but I got there in the end", he said after the match.

Marconi had very little time to reply and their frustrations boiled over on several occasions, resulting in the dismissal of Tayfun Buyukopru for a second bookable offence.

After the match Marconi coach David Barrett voiced his frustration over the loss.

"I'm disappointed. I thought we battled hard and dominated in central midfield. We had chances we could have taken, I thought we had enough. We definitely didn't deserve to lose; we just failed to finish off when it mattered."

Now that his side has a one point hold on fourth spot, Manly's match winner Robbie Cattanach is hoping they won't let it slip.

"It's going to be tough. We've got Penrith away followed by Blacktown at home and then APIA Leichhardt. So we've still got to play first and second on the ladder. We're confident, but we're not going to look too far ahead."

With key players still to return from injury, and regular coach Phil Moss returning from Canberra with his A-League coaching license on Sunday, Manly look primed to charge into the finals series.

"We've had a bit of disruption with some injuries forcing blokes to play out of position, so we'll be a stronger team when players start coming back," Swancott said.

"A bit of competition for spots won't hurt anyone, it's just going to make everyone hungrier."

NARRABEEN Y.C. will be hoping Beacon Hill Y.C. don't qualify for the finals - and it won't be out of spite but simply because Beacon Hill have established themselves as Narrabeen's true bogey team.

Following the 2-1 victory Beacon Hill remain the only team to have defeated Narrabeen this year, a feat they have achieved twice.

Narrabeen coach Dean Harding said it was a game to forget.

"I don't mind losing, but I don't like it when we just don't turn up to play," he said.

"To be honest, everyone was below their best and I wasn't happy with the game as a whole."

"But full credit to Beacon Hill, they outplayed us and deserved the win. It was a fair result."

Beacon Hill struck the first two blows through Simon Teofilo and Bernie Nursoo, before Narrabeen's Paul Martin scored on half-time to give the away team some hope. But with no additions to the score in the second half, the 2-1 score line remained and Narrabeen were left wondering what it was about Beacon Hill that they found so troubling.

Beacon Hill coach Dave Wilson didn't want to read into his sides dominance over Narrabeen so far this year.

"I think there are about six teams (in this competition) that on their day can beat anyone else," he said.

"(Against Narrabeen) we've had a bit of luck I suppose, but in general it was just a good hard game of football and it's nice to get a win."

In other results, BTH Raiders locked in their fourth win of the year when they beat CC Strikers 2-1 and Pittwater extended their lead at the top of the table by beating Dee Why 1-0.

Brookvale accounted for Forest Killarney 3-0 and Harbord's dreary season continued with a 3-0 loss to Manly Vale.

Wakehurst beat Mosman 1-0 to consolidate their top four position.

Socceroos Hold Own Against Uruguay

The Qantas Socceroos were narrowly defeated 2-1 by Uruguay at Telstra Stadium last Saturday night. Uruguay came from a goal down to take the lead 13 minutes from the end, before surviving a strong finish from the home side.

The result was cruel to an Australian side that more than matched their more experienced and credentialed Uruguayan opponents throughout the entire 90 minutes.

Australia had opened the scoring after six minutes, through Mile Sterjovski, but the scores were level in the 40th minute when Diego Forlan pounced from close range. The match was delicately poised, until an unfortunate error by Australian keeper Brad Jones in the 77th minute allowed Uruguay to grab the eventual winner.

However while the result left a 'sour taste' in Graham Arnold's mouth after the match, he couldn't fault the performance of his young team, with several doing their chances of playing at the Asian Cup finals in July no harm at all.

While the five World Cup players, led by example, the likes of Michael Thwaite, Patrick Kisnorbo, Brett Holman, Scott McDonald and Carl Valeri all performed with distinction, on what was a tough and often testy night against 'Los Celeste'.

Australia started superbly controlling possession and looking to get down the flanks, particularly on the left to expose Diogo.

Sterjovski proved to be his tormentor in the opening half and it was the FC Basel midfielder, who provided the perfect start for the home side.

Emerton did brilliantly down the right to beat two defenders; sending in a low cross that caused confusion in the Uruguay defence. After several swipes at the ball by Sterjovski in the six-yard box, he managed to get clear and smash the ball home. Thwaite then showed what this match meant when he lunged late at Pablo Garcia, which saw both teams come together and earn the Australian a yellow card.

Sterjovski was giving Diogo a torrid time to further emphasise his value to this team since his exploits at the World Cup last year.

While it took some time, Recoba started to impose himself on the match and in the 22nd minute almost set up an equaliser for his team. His low, swinging cross was flicked on at the near post, which found Vicente Sanchez who hit the bar with his header, but he was offside in any case.

A lively Holman played himself into a goal scoring position shortly afterwards, but a brilliant tackle by Garcia robbed him as he was about to shoot.

While Recoba looked threatening on the break, it was Australia who still controlled the majority of play

and but for some poor final passes, could have exposed the Uruguay defence.

Uruguay looked most threatening at set pieces from Recoba and Australia had a warning in the 35th minute when Lugano headed inches wide from a Recoba cross.

Minutes later the scores were level when a quick free kick on the left, found Recoba on the right and his skidding low cross beat three Australian players including Jones, with Forlan gleefully poking home from close range.

Buoyed by the goal, Uruguay almost had the lead at half time, with another dangerous Recoba free kick, headed by Dario Rodriguez, which took a slight deflection off Neill, forcing a good save from Jones.

The second half saw Uruguay up the tempo somewhat, with Australia unable to enjoy the possession they did in the first half. However chances were few and far between with an Emerton free kick going well wide on the hour mark, the first shot in anger of the half.

Australia's defence had some nervous moments soon after when Rodriguez had a shot deflected over the top of the bar. Wilkshire showed he was no mug from the dead ball, curling a 25 metre free kick towards the top corner, which Fabian Carini did well to gather.

But three minutes later came the turning point, when Jones dropped, what looked like a routine take from a Guillermo Giacomazzi cross, which fell perfectly for Recoba, who couldn't believe his luck and headed into the empty net.

Substitute Nick Carle provided some spark for Australia and did well on the edge of the 18-yard box to tee up, McDonald. His low cross, across the six-yard line somehow beat everyone.

McDonald then had the best chance to equalise, when he was able to go one-on-one on a quick counter. But forced onto his left foot, McDonald's shot from outside of the area, sailed high and wide.

Australia had several chances with free kicks in the dying minutes, but Carini stood tall for Uruguay to keep the home side out and in some ways exact a little revenge for their 2005 World Cup qualifying loss at the same venue 20 months ago.

Coach Graham Arnold was naturally disappointed with the result, but pleased with many aspects of the performance.

"Overall it was a good performance," Arnold told Fox Sports after the game. "The result does leave a sour taste though.

"Over the 90 minutes, I thought we matched them. The young boys didn't take a backward step and I think it (the performance) showed we are heading down the right path for the future."

But, do we lack the killer instinct

There is an alarming tendency among Australia's football fraternity to ignore vital aspects of our rising game that need to be addressed. It's becoming football's version of political correctness.

It is as if criticising our sport when it is trying so hard to establish itself in a notorious, non-football country is just not on.

After copping so much flak over the years from sections of the media that had their own agenda and interests to protect, it appears that the last thing our game needs at the moment is criticism from within the family, even if it is constructive.

The good feeling the A-League has generated among thousands of followers, for example, has overridden the fact that the general standard of play still is not what it should be. But you never hear about this.

The Socceroos, who are the flagship of the game in Australia, are not immune from this special treatment either.

After competing so valiantly at the 2006 World Cup in Germany, our team has become a far more appealing brand, second only to Ricky Ponting's world champion cricketers as Australia's most popular national side.

Which might explain why more than 60,000 fans paid big money to watch a side that was always going to be heavily depleted against Uruguay at the weekend.

Much has been said about the composed way they went about their business against the wily South Americans.

It is obvious that Graham Arnold has taken on board the philosophy of his predecessor and former mentor Guus Hiddink.

Although most of the players who performed so admirably in Germany were absent for several reasons against Uruguay, there seems to be no major difference in style and mentality between Hiddink's and Arnold's teams.

Which augurs well for the Asian Cup and the long-term future of the side because controlled possession, we hear, is the key to success in the modern game. And nobody does this better than the Dutch.

But this is where Australia's problems arise. Not for the first time the team's chronic inability to find the net has to be underlined.

The Socceroos simply do not score enough goals at the highest level. Scoring has always been our Achilles heel and it still is, unfortunately, if the weekend clash is taken into account.

We hear all sorts of contributing factors for this malaise: Harry Kewell is always injured, we miss too many chances, Mark Viduka does not perform as well for his country as he does for his clubs, sometimes we are naive and referees rarely give 'unfashionable' Australia the benefit of the doubt.

Valid points indeed but the real reason Australia does not score enough goals is because it does not create too many chances. Which means there is something wrong with Australia's game.

This was again blatantly obvious during the June 2 match against Uruguay. Arnold's men played wonderfully well in the first half an hour, finding each other beautifully and generally dictating the tempo of the match on a poor pitch that did them no favours.

The Australians continued with this patient approach even in the second half when the visitors came more in to the game. But how often was the Uruguay goalkeeper troubled?

Despite keeping their shape for most of the match, the Australians hardly ever looked like scoring and even Mile Sterjovski's scrambled goal owed as much to his and Brett Emerton's perseverance as to Uruguay's comic defending on the occasion.

After a disappointing 1-1 draw with Ghana last November, Arnold told me that as long as his players keep creating opportunities the goals will come eventually. "I would be more worried if we do not make chances," he said.

Well, the Uruguay match must have been an eye-opener, then.

Perhaps the problem lies in the fact that the team can be too elaborate in its build-up, thus giving the opposition enough time to regroup and snuff out any danger.

Perhaps Australia needs to make better use of the flanks than it is doing at the moment.

Or perhaps the team needs to have a good look at the effectiveness of its lone-striker system. Who knows, giving up a midfield spot in favour of another genuine striker might be more rewarding.

Either way, Arnold will have to come up with answers in the Asian Cup because if our measured, passing game would be ideal in the sapping heat and humidity of Bangkok next month, it is equally true that possession alone would not guarantee victory.

Viduka "accepts Toon deal"

Middlesbrough's Australian striker Mark Viduka has agreed in principle to join north-east rivals Newcastle United, it was reported.

The 31-year-old has given Boro boss Gareth Southgate the answer he was dreading and decided not to extend his stay at the Riverside Stadium, PA understands.

The Magpies have been courting the Australia international for a year and now appear to have made a decisive breakthrough amid interest from West Ham, Portsmouth and Birmingham.

Further talks are expected to take place later this week as Viduka enjoys a break before heading off on Asian Cup duty with his country.

Should Newcastle push home their interest in the former Celtic and Leeds frontman, they would bring an end to his hugely successful three-year spell on Teesside.

The Melbourne-born player arrived at the Riverside in a £4.5million (\$10.8m) deal from Elland Road in July 2004 as then manager Steve McClaren assembled a new-look strike-force in tandem with Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink.

Ayegbeni Yakubu joined them in a £7.5million switch from Portsmouth a year later, but following the Dutchman's departure last summer it is Viduka who has risen to the fore.

His 19 goals last season - seven of them in his last five starts - were key to Boro's successful fight against relegation from the Barclays Premiership and took his tally for the club to 42 in 100 appearances, 20 of them as a substitute.

That sort of return, allied with his ability to hold the ball up and bring team-mates into play, ensured he was in demand as his contract ran down and with Newcastle having twice failed to prise him away from Boro, their return was almost inevitable.

Alan Shearer's retirement and Shola Ameobi's hip injury left the Magpies without that type of striker last season, and while speculation continues over Michael Owen's future at St James' Park, the prospect of having Viduka, Owen, Ameobi and Obafemi Martins in his squad is one which will excite new boss Sam Allardyce.

Southgate's emotions will be entirely different as he faces up to the task of having to replace his star man just months after pulling off a major coup to land Real Madrid defender Jonathan Woodgate.

The Boro manager was desperate to keep his prize asset and will hope there is still time to talk him around, but it appears the lure of a new challenge at St James' Park has won the day.

Portsmouth's interest in taking Yakubu back to Fratton Park will now be even more unwelcome with fans who implored Viduka to stay after seeing him claim a match-winning double against Fulham on the final day of the season now preparing for life without him.

Meanwhile, Manchester City midfielder Joey Barton is expected on Tyneside today to discuss a proposed move to Newcastle.

Arnold thinks Dukes will play

Australia national team coach Graham Arnold is confident Mark Viduka will feature for the Socceroos at the AFC Asian Cup despite speculation surrounding the Middlesbrough striker's future.

Arnold has admitted to 'some fears' that Viduka, who is currently on a three-week break in the USA, could pull out of the tournament, which begins on July 8 against Oman in Bangkok.

The 31-year-old is reported to be on the verge of leaving the Riverside Stadium, with Newcastle and

newly-promoted Birmingham leading the race for the former Melbourne Knights frontman.

Viduka's chances of playing in the Asian Cup received a boost when it was reported that the big striker had agreed in principle to join the Magpies.

Viduka missed the Asian Cup warm-up defeat by Uruguay in Sydney but Arnold remains confident he will include the Melbourne-born striker in his 23-man squad for Australia's maiden Asian Cup assault.

"I guess these sort of things cross your mind from time to time," Arnold told The Australian.

"There is always something cropping up with the national team in terms of player availability."

"Mark has a lot on his plate at the moment, so he has every right to take his time to come up with the right decision."

"I spoke to him before the match against China and during my last visit to England, and he was very keen to play, and Mark is a man of his word."

"He admitted, however, that he was very tired from a long season and needed a good break, which is why he did not come to Sydney for the Uruguay game."

Celtic-bound Scott McDonald is ready to step into the squad should Viduka withdraw, while defenders Patrick Kisnorbo and Michael Thwaite, midfielder Carl Valeri and striker Brett Holman are all expected to get a call-up after the young quartet impressed during the 2-1 defeat by the South Americans on Saturday.

"It was good to see the younger players perform under pressure in front of their own supporters at home, because when you play friendly or Asian Cup games away from home, you don't get that same type of pressure," added Arnold.

Matildas suffer 2-0 defeat to Korea

The Matildas have suffered a 2-0 defeat to DPR Korea tonight, in what is a blow to their chances of qualifying for the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing.

Level on points going into the match, DPR now hold a distinct advantage going into the return leg of their group match meetings next weekend in Coffs Harbour. Only the winner of the group will progress to the Olympic Games next year.

Backed by a capacity crowd of over 30,000 people, both goals were scored by DPR captain Ri Kum Suk, coming either side of half time, with the second coming from the penalty spot in the 55th minute. Matildas coach Tom Sermanni had no complaints with the result and was encouraged by the way the players battled and with the chances created towards the end of the game.

"I can't complain about result in what was a hostile environment," Sermanni said straight after the match. "We needed to battle away and we did very well at that for most of the game."

"The turning point was the penalty 10 minutes into the second half, but we finished the game encouragingly and had a couple of good chances near the end."

"We now have to regroup and get organised for next week; lets hope we can try and create a similar environment back in Coffs Harbour as they created here."

DPR had the better of the first half, controlling possession and putting pressure on the Matildas defence.

In the 20th minute, Melissa Barbieri made a great save to deny DPR with a close header, while another free kick was also close in the 31st minute. The pressure told in the 35th minute, when Suk was able to turn on the edge of the box and slotted her shot past Barbieri.

However the turning point of the match came ten minutes after half time, when a scramble in the box, saw DPR awarded a penalty for a handball, although the Australian players were incensed that a DPR player had handled the ball first.

Suk made no mistake slotting home low to Barbieri's left. It was almost 3-0 two minutes later, when a looping shot hit the crossbar.

The last 20 minutes saw Australia rally, with substitutes Lisa De Vanna and Sarah Walsh causing problems by running at the DPR defence.

In the 69th minute, Collette McCallum almost saw her free kick into the box, diverted into the net by a DPR player.

De Vanna had a great chance to pull a goal back in the 78th minute, when chased down a ball over the top, but DPR came out and blocked near edge of box.

It was all Australia in the final 10 minutes, with the DPR keeper fumbling several shots, but luckily for her nothing came of them.

The final chance fell to Australian captain Cheryl Salisbury, but under pressure was unable to divert her header from a McCallum cross down and it sailed over the bar
