Manly United 2
Sutherland Sharks 0

MANLY United have revived their finals' hopes with a 2-0 shut-out victory over Sutherland at Cromer Park last Sunday.

It was United's first league victory in four weeks and has elevated them to within two points of Marconi who make up the top four after 12 rounds.

With A-League star Jonti Richter on the bench, Moss again went with Robbie Cattanach and James Monie as his starting strikers and the move paid off handsomely. Manly coach Phil Moss said the win, built around a quality performance from striker Robbie Cattanach, was a crucial step in steering the club towards the finals.

Cattanach having arguably his best game of the season setting up the opening goal for Michael Lloyd-Green and scoring the second himself.

"Robbie (Cattanach) has improved immeasurably this season and his performance today was all class," said Moss.

"It was a crucial game and the players were under pressure to produce not just a good performance but also a good result," he said yesterday.

"I thought we delivered two good halves of football and dominated the majority of the match. We knew the league would virtually split into two this weekend and with us in fifth we wanted to ensure it was a top five and bottom five instead of a top four and bottom six."

"Had that happened, our finals' hopes would have taken a fairly significant battering but as it stands now we have given ourselves every chance. We need to beat the teams below us and at least one above us to make the finals."

The home side dominated proceedings from start to finish on Sunday with Cattanach central to the team's fifth win of the season. The striker created the first goal for debutant midfielder Michael Lloyd-Green midway through the opening half.

Cattanach then completed the job in the 60th minute when Joey Schirripa floated a free-kick to the far post and Monie nodded down into the path of Cattanach who tapped in from close range. It was Cattanach's eighth goal of the season and keeps him just one shy of Golden Boot leader Robbie Younis from Apia.

"Robbie just continues to get better and better each week and his decision-making on the ball and work rate off it is chalk and cheese with last year," Moss said.

"I'm thrilled for him because he has put in the hard work to get to where he is."

Neill warning to Asian Cup rivals

Qantas Socceroo defender Lucas Neill has sent a warning to its Asian Cup rivals, declaring he believes Australia can go through the tournament undefeated, if it approaches the tournament with the right mental approach.

Neill firmly believes if the team approaches the tournament in the same manner they did the World Cup, then there is no reason why they can't go through unbeaten.

"From a player point of view, I expect us to go there and be undefeated," Neill said from his home base in London."

"I really think that we've got a great team now and a squad now that can handle the conditions."

"Enough of us have played on the big stage now that we won't be intimidated by the teams that we're going to play against."

Played throughout the month of July across four countries – Indonesia, Malaysia, Vietnam and Thailand, where the Qantas Socceroos will be based for the group matches, Neill has the belief that they can overcome the traditional powerhouses of Japan, South Korea, Iran and Saudi Arabia, all of whom were at the 2006 World Cup finals, but were knocked out in the first round.

He concedes the biggest obstacle could be themselves if they don't approach the tournament and matches in the right state of mind.

"We can't be complacent and we need to approach each game professionally", he said pointedly. "We'll make sure we get through our group and not make any silly mistakes in the late stages, because I want to go over there to win."

"If we don't approach every game with the perfect preparation, with the perfect mentality, then we're going to come unstuck."

"The obvious teams around us, like Japan and South Korea, who with World Cup experience, will definitely be strong teams. We'll need to be at our very best, on and off the pitch, mentally and physically, to overcome them."

Neill is looking forward to the break and Australia's first major foray into Asia's premier competition. Australia will start favorite to top its group, which also contains Iraq, Oman and tournament host Thailand, with the top two teams going through to the quarter-finals.

Its opening match is against Oman on July 8, followed by Iraq on July 13 and then Thailand on July 16. All matches are being played in Bangkok, Thailand.

Australia official preparations will start with a match against Uruguay in Sydney on June 2, with a second match against Singapore on June 30 in Singapore.

Aussies overseas do us proud

Australian players enjoyed success on the final day of the English Premier League season, with Harry Kewell and Mark Viduka getting amongst the goals and Lucas Neill, John Filan and Josip Skoko all surviving the drop down to The Championship after dramatic wins.

Most interest centred on the battle for relegation, with Lucas Neill's West Ham doing the double over champions Manchester United with a 1-0 win at Old Trafford. Neill played his part with a solid performance in defence that win lifted the Hammers three points clear of Sheffield United, who were locked in battle with Filan and Skoko's Wigan Athletic.

The scenario was simple, Sheffield United needed just a point and Wigan needed a win, with the two Aussies starting on the bench for Wigan. Skoko came on midway through the first half and in the end, it was Wigan that grabbed all three points, joining Sheffield on the same points, but with a one goal better goal difference.

Qantas Socceroo midfielder Harry Kewell did his chances of playing in the UEFA Champions League final no harm, with an encouraging half hour in Liverpool's final match of the Premier League campaign – a 2-2 draw at home against Charlton Athletic.

Kewell came on in the 57th minute and promptly lifted the home side, setting up Liverpool's first equaliser and then scoring from the penalty spot to tie the match at 2-2. Kewell also had several other shots at goal, as Liverpool finished 3rd.

Having only just returned from a long-term injury, Kewell's cameo performance will have pleased his coach Rafa Benitez, ahead of the final against AC Milan on Wednesday (23rd) week.

With much speculation about where he will be playing next season, Mark Viduka ended the season on a high, scoring twice in Middlesbrough's 3-1 win over Fulham. Viduka was at his best, cracking two goals past Fulham keeper Niemi that took his season goal tally to 19. Mark Schwarzer played a full game and Brad Jones remained on the bench, as Boro finished 12th.

Brett Emerton played a full game, as Blackburn Rovers played in the days most entertaining match, a 3-3 draw at home against Reading. Reading's Aussie keeper Adam Federici came on midway through the first half, as the two battled it out for a chance at earning a place in the UEFA Cup next season. Unfortunately both fell short, with Blackburn finishing 10th and Reading in 8th.

No other Aussies featured on the final day, with Tim Cahill's (back in Australia recovering from injury) Everton finishing 6th, while Craig Moore's (hamstring) Newcastle United finished in 13th.

Meanwhile, Marco Bresciano played a full game, as Palermo's dismal run continued with a 2-1 loss away to relegated Ascoli. The loss has seriously threatened Palermo's hopes of qualifying for the UEFA Cup.

Vince Grella had better fortunes, playing a full game in Parma's 4-1 win over Messina, which lifted them out of the relegation zone and up to a healthy 13th place. They are still not out of the woods with two matches remaining, but their big win helped their goal difference significantly in what is a tight battle for the last relegation place.

Former players nominated for FFA Board

Two former national team players and one of Australia's most experienced businessmen have been nominated to join the board of Football Federation Australia.

The Chairman of FFA, Mr Frank Lowy AC, today announced that after a rigorous process he and the board of FFA had identified "the best possible combination" to oversee the strategic direction of football for the next phase of its development.

Mr Lowy said former Matilda vice-captain Moya Dodd and recently retired Group Chief Executive of AXA, Les Owen, would be personally supported and nominated by him and the board for election at an Extraordinary General Meeting in Sydney on 3 June. A member of the Soccerroos' 1974 World Cup team, goalkeeper Jack Reilly, who represented Australia 42 times, will also join the board.

The new board arrangements will be made in conjunction with a pivotal step in the reform process for football in Australia with all nine state and territory football associations being admitted as State Body Members of the FFA, which completes the process of adopting the new constitution. A still to be determined individual representing the Hyundai A-League clubs will also be admitted.

This is the culmination of three years of exhaustive consultation, resulting in all state and territory bodies changing the name of their organisations from soccer to football, and providing a united front nationally for the game to move forward.

Mr Lowy said these developments were an important step for the governance of football and would considerably strengthen the strategic management of the game.

The new board would comprise: Frank Lowy (Chairman); Brian Schwartz (Deputy Chairman); Moya Dodd; Les Owen; Jack Reilly; Ron Walker; Phil Wolanski.

"Six of the new board members are steeped in football knowledge and culture and have been involved both on and off the pitch at all levels of the game, and the remaining director, Ron Walker, has a wealth of experience in sport and major international events," he said.

"In addition to their passion for football, the new board has a blend of corporate experience at the highest level, legal expertise and community involvement.

"I believe that the mix offered by the existing and newly nominated directors can provide just the kind of board direction the game needs now to take it to the next phase of its development."

"Another asset is the fact that Les Owen now spends about six months each year based in London. This will prove valuable in helping FFA maintain its links with international football and stay in touch with developments in that part of the world."

Biographical details of the proposed new board members are below.

In accordance with the requirement under the FFA constitution for there to be an election of three directors at the EGM, Suzanne Williams and Ron Walker will retire at the meeting and the position formerly held by John Singleton (who resigned his directorship at the end of 2005) will be filled. Ron Walker has been nominated to stand for re-election with the full support of the Board.

Mr Ron Harvey who was appointed by the Board as a director will step down at the meeting.

Mr Lowy paid tribute to the work that the departing directors have done during their four-year term.

"Suzanne's contribution, particularly as a member of the Audit Committee, and to FFA generally, has been invaluable and I thank her warmly for that contribution.

"Like Suzanne, Ron Harvey has been a tireless worker for football, representing FFA internationally at FIFA and at OFC when we were a member of that Confederation. He too leaves the Board with our thanks for a job well done.

"We trust that Suzanne and Ron will not be lost to the game and will continue to be valued members of the football community."

Mr Lowy said football was entering a busy period with the upcoming game against Uruguay in Sydney on 2 June, and the Asian Cup in July.

"The Uruguay match will attract enormous interest, and we expect to field a very strong squad for the Asian Cup campaign," he said.

"This will be the first time Australia has competed in the Asian Cup and provides a fantastic opportunity for us to perform again on the world stage.

"The competition will undoubtedly be very tough, but we have very high expectations for the Soccerroos."

MOYA DODD

Moya Dodd is a former Vice-Captain of Australia and played for the Matildas from 1986-1995. She joined CRA International from Network Economics Consulting Group and brings with her a wealth of expertise in strategic decision-making, business development, legal and regulatory issues management, advocacy, and negotiation. Ms Dodd is a telecommunications and new media professional with over 14 years experience.

Ms Dodd has hands-on experience as both a lawyer and a commercial decision-maker in telecommunications regulatory policy and issues management, strategic advocacy, content pricing and channel management, and internet business development.

JACK REILLY

Jack Reilly represented Australia as a goalkeeper 42 times including the 1974 World Cup in West Germany. Mr Reilly has 35 years experience in the Australian financial industry and has held the positions of Chairman of Victoria Point Ltd, Chairman of Council of Authorised Money Market Dealers and Deputy Secretary of Department of Treasury Victoria. An active member of the Football community, Mr Reilly has been a Director of Melbourne Victory Football Club.

LES OWEN

Les Owen has always had a passionate interest in football since his boyhood in Liverpool. He represented Merseyside Schools in 1967 and was Club Captain of Manchester University Football Club in 1971. He has supported Liverpool Football Club all his life and is a season ticket holder.

Mr Owen has over 35 years experience in the insurance and wealth management industries. From January 2000 to September 2006, Mr Owen was the Group Chief Executive of AXA Asia Pacific Holdings Limited. Under his leadership AXA APH successfully undertook a major transformation programme which resulted in significant improvements in performance and shareholder value. Prior to his appointment at AXA Asia Pacific Les was the Chief Executive of AXA Sun Life plc in the UK.

He is a non executive director of Computershare and AXA UK, and is a member of the Australian Treasurer's Financial Sector Advisory Council. Mr Owen is an Australian citizen who is now splitting his time between Australia and the UK.

Sydney FC go after Phillip Cocu

Sydney FC's disjointed performance against the Shanghai Shenhua spoilers in the AFC Champions League brought home the need for Australia's glamour club to do everything in its power to snare midfield organiser Phillip Cocu.

Evidence suggests there is not much point in going for a gun striker as a marquee player.

What the class of 2007/08 needs most is a midfield master with a degree in class, expertise and leadership who can run the show and create openings.

The lanky Dutchman, who at 36 is in the twilight of his stellar career and pondering a move Down Under, has these attributes in abundance.

It was commendable for Sydney to engage such a high-profile veteran as Dwight Yorke two years ago but what's the point of having another ace marksman if there is nobody to give him constant quality service.

Sydney would be much better off having an experienced bloke like Cocu in the middle of the park, creating a steady stream of scoring opportunities. He's quite a handy finisher, too.

Yorke, remember, made a much better contribution to the team's economy when he dropped back to midfield in the second part of Sydney's championship-winning season in 2005-06.

With Yorke directing traffic and spraying passes all over the field at his leisurely pace, Sydney's game improved beyond recognition.

The climax to this tactical transformation came in the grand final against Central Coast Mariners when Yorke created the winning goal for Steve Corica.

The moral here is that a star player will always make things happen in midfield, which is where matches are often won and lost. More so now than ever.

"This is exactly why we need Cocu," Sydney coach Branko Culina said.

"The man is a champion, a born leader who captained Barcelona and Holland and who was playing in the Champions League with Eindhoven only three months ago."

Culina would have loved to be able to avail himself of a 'Cocu' against Shanghai on ACL Matchday 5.

Sydney dominated possession for long periods but rarely found a way past Shanghai's resolute and cynical defence. Sydney's three or four chances were only half-chances, really.

Although Sydney to its credit never lost its shape even when frustration set in and passes started to go astray, it was blatantly obvious that a cool head was needed to direct proceedings in the engine room.

Perhaps Shanghai's reluctance to come out of its shell and play football caught Sydney by surprise. Culina's men might have been unprepared for a problem they usually do not have to deal with.

Hopefully they will have learnt from the experience. After all, this is what Australia's entry into Asia was all about.

Olyroos still in the race

Chesterfield central defender Aaron Downes scored just three minutes in to his Olyroos debut as Australia's U-23 side wore down Iran for a 3-1 win at Hindmarsh Stadium, edging closer to qualification for the Beijing Olympics.

The 22-year-old netted with a glancing header at the near post from a Kristian Sarkies corner that beat a sea of bodies to give Australia a positive start.

But Iran levelled less than a minute later on a fast counter which ended with striker Vahid Amraei slotting the ball into the corner of the net after beating his opponent.

The Olyroos regained their poise just before halftime as striker Mark Bridge coolly slotted a 43rd minute penalty for a 2-1 lead after Newcastle United midfielder James Troisi was tripped in the penalty area by Iran captain Hassein Kaebi.

Dynamic Troisi then netted his first national goal in the 53rd minute from close range after Sydney FC defender Nik Topor-Stanley beat an opponent on the left and squared the ball back invitingly for him to drive past the keeper for 3-1.

The win enabled the Olyroos to surge into second spot in the Group D qualifying phase with one match to play away against Jordan, needing only a draw to advance.

But the Olyroos had to fend off the wily Iranians with just 10 men for the final 25 minutes after Bridge was sent off for a clash off the ball with Mohammed Nazari, who was cautioned.

Adelaide United striker Nathan Burns had a shot cleared off the line in the 17th minute while Sarkies and midfielder Neil Kilkeny went close in the second half as Australia held on to their second win in five games in Group D matches.

Iran slipped to third in the group, three points adrift of Australia following the loss and rarely troubled the Olyroo defence marshalled brilliantly by captain Mark Milligan.

Australia will miss Bridge and Topor-Stanley for its last match against Jordan on June 6 after the latter was cautioned in the dying minutes, his second of the phase.

Olyroos coach Rob Baan said his players had shown they wanted to take the initiative against Iran in this key match and maintained it the entire match.

"We still have to travel to Jordan to get a point to make sure of qualification for the next stage," he said.

"But we showed that when all the players are available just how well we can play."

Baan said his players had performed admirably through the entire match despite playing as a 10-man unit for most of the second half after Bridge's dismissal.

"I was happy with the whole game except for their equaliser," he said.

Baan said more work with Australia's wing backs such as Topor-Stanley had paid dividends.

He also praised Troisi's contribution at key stages of the win and a solid debut from Downes in defence.

Iran's coach Vinko Begovic said his side had failed to keep shape in the first half despite equalising early on and paid the penalty.

"We really needed to beat Australia at home the first time instead of drawing 0-0 to have been closer to qualifying in this group stage," he said.

Security guards ejected about 10 spectators from the ground during the game after some heated scuffles in the crowd of more than 6,300.
