NSW Premier League

Manly United 0
Sydney Olympic 0

A newly rejuvenated Sydney Olympic side that added six new faces to its squad in the space of two weeks, finished scoreless with top four aspirants Manly United at Belmore Sports Ground last Sunday afternoon.

In what was seen as a fair result for both sides, Olympic keeper Sam Emmanouil and Manly shotstopper Brad Swancott pulled off a string of saves in earning their clubs a point each.

A faultless performance from Manly goalkeeper Brad Swancott has prompted United coach Phil Moss to declare his number one gloveman as the best in the league.

With Olympic fielding the likes of Nick Carle, Tarek Elrich, Peter Zorbas, Chima Ngoawzi and Nahuel Arrarte, the hosts were expected to win comfortably.

But the peninsula side, after weathering a blistering early storm, gave as good as they got to walk away with a point.

"That Olympic side we played was completely different to the side that is sitting lowly on the table," Moss said.

"I'm just relieved to have come away from Belmore with something - my players were fantastic."

"Particularly the bloke between the posts."

"Swanny has been a revelation for this club," Moss said of Swancott.

"We are now in the process of nutting out a new two-year deal with him and he's priority number one for me - he is a fantastic all-round goalkeeper, a

leader, a thinker and a pleasure to work with. "He has to be one of the best goalkeepers outside of the A-League in this country."

While Olympic's chief attacking weapon outside the box was undoubtedly Carle, it was the lower profiled Arrarte who tested Swancott's full range of ability twice in the second half with cracking strikes.

At the other end, Richie Williams, Bradley Groves and Robbie Cattanaich all tested Olympic 'keeper Sam Emmanuel.

The point lifts Manly United to within a point of fourth-placed Marconi with five rounds remaining.

For the Blues, new names such as Peter Zorbas, Nahuel Arrarte, Chima Nwaogazi, James Kovas and Nick Carle all made their debuts in front of what was a vocal and boisterous crowd at Belmore.

The opening half saw few chances for both teams as both sides tested each other out with much of the possession falling into the midfield. Manly looked star-dazed in the first half as Olympic pressed for an opening goal but all of the action took place in the second half which catapulted the match into what was a frenetic finish.

The only real chance in the first half fell in the twenty-fourth minute when Andrew Mailer had his strike from outside the box well parried for a corner by Emmanuel.

The visitors had a terrific chance to take the lead in the forty-ninth minute when target man James Monie had his header spray wide after what was a terrific Roberto Hamad cross.

In the fifty-seventh minute Olympic went close to scoring when Nick Carle played a neat ball to Arrarte who smashed a sizzling strike from 25-yards which Swancott pushed out for a corner.

A minute later from the resulting corner, Arrarte's pin-point cross fell to the head of Nwaogazi, but his effort was well held by Manly's number one custodian.

On the sixty minute mark, Carle further stamped his authority on the match when he sent a stunning 30-yard strike which Swancott saved brilliantly.

The home side thought they had a penalty in the sixty-fifth minute when Zorbas was tackled by Hamad which saw the Manly player get more leg than ball, however referee Attila Stabinger waved played on much to the dismay of the thousand plus crowd.

Hamad was beginning to make a nuisance of himself

and nearly set-up Manly's first goal as he played a nice ball to Michael Williams in the box, but his shot was well held by Emmanuel.

Arrarte was desperately seeking his first goal in the Blue and White colours and almost got it in the seventy-first minute when he unleashed yet another thunderbolt from outside the box but again Swancott was equal to the task pushing the ball out for a corner.

Olympic were hitting their straps late into the second half as in the seventy-fifth minute Carle's shot was looking goal bound from inside the box but took a wicked deflection off Richard Williams which went for a corner.

Two minutes later, Swancott pulled yet another great save again thwarting Carle.

Manly substitute Bradley Groves almost had his name lit in lights when his shot from outside the box was again well held by the promising young Blues custodian.

The home side looked far more superior in scoring that vital goal however were nearly dealt with a killer blow in the ninety-second minute. Surprisingly, Michael Williams was left alone inside the Blues' box with his resulting shot from ten-meters heading towards goal.

Emmanouil had other ideas and the young shotstopper pulled off a spectacular save in keeping the Blues in the match.

With referee Stabinger holding originally four minutes of injury time, chaos broke when an extra minute was surprisingly added.

Olympic substitute striker James Kovas made a terrific run inside the Manly box, his strike was saved by Swancott who could only parry it a couple of meters away which then fell to Ante Deur who

smashed the ball in what looked to be a legitimate goal.

However as the referee was about to whistle for the goal, the linesman's flag was up and the decision was made that Deur was in an off-side position.

Seconds after that fateful decision, time was called on the match as both team's settled for a point.

The Blues had Emmanouil, Carle and Arrarte as their best while for Phil Moss' side, Swancott and Richard Williams were their standout players.

Manly face sixth-placed Sydney United in an important (sixth, two points adrift of Manly on 17 points) game on Sunday at Cromer Park.

A CONTROVERSIAL penalty awarded to Wakehurst with four minutes left on the clock has consigned Harbord Seaside's to their sixth loss of the season and leaves them at the bottom of the ladder.

The 3-2 loss left Harbord coach John Karaparashos wondering when the luck will fall his team's way.

"It's crazy what is happening to us this year," Karaparashos said.

"We're really disappointed, it's frustrating that every week we dominate the games but we can't finish."

Wakehurst coach Gary McGinnis was proud of his team, who played the final 25 minutes of the match a man down after Frank Gigliotti was red-carded for a stray elbow.

"Considering we only had 10 men for 25 minutes we did well to come away with the points," he said.

"There is a bit of relief from our point of view, but I felt sorry for John, because they played really well and deserved a point."

"I have to give credit to Harbord and to their coach and players."

Brad Walker opened the scoring for Wakehurst in the 30th minute, but a determined Seaside's outfit equalised straight away with Hayden Mathis scoring off a corner.

The Seaside's struck again, this time through Japanese player Yayia and that looked like it would be enough to take them into the break ahead 2-1, but Nick Sheather scored in injury time to lock the game up.

But in the end, Nick Rainey's penalty proved to be the difference between the two sides.

"It was very disappointing, to give a penalty like that which clearly wasn't a penalty that late in the game, especially when at least one other penalty decision didn't go our way," Karaparashos said.

In other games, Beacon Hill thrashed BTH Raiders 6-1, Narrabeen beat Forest 3-0, and Brookvale enjoyed a 4-1 win over Dee Why, while Manly Vale and Pittwater had 1-0 victories.

No Moore chances for Roar

Queensland Roar has confirmed that it has failed to entice Socceroos defender Craig Moore to join the club next season.

A disappointed Roar CEO Lawrence Oudendyk stated that he would have loved to have seen Moore at Suncorp Stadium but it's believed a \$1million a season asking price was too rich for the Brisbane-based club.

"We have had discussions with Craig Moore's agent over the last three or four days and unfortunately we have been unable to reach an agreement on his salary," said Oudendyk.

"Craig is a very good player and is still able to earn far more money overseas than he can earn in Australia. Regrettably that puts his services out of our reach."

"As the Socceroos captain at the last FIFA World Cup we would have loved to have had Craig Moore at our club. However, at this point in his career it is not financially viable for us to bring him back to Brisbane."

Former Rangers defender Moore is on Queensland's Sunshine Coast after being released by Premier League outfit Newcastle United. He is expected to hold talks with another two A-League clubs while he has had interest from clubs in Dubai and Britain.

Roar coach Frank Farina has now missed out on Moore and Socceroos striker John Aloisi but remains determined to build a solid squad.

"I made no secret of the fact that I wanted to sign Craig Moore for next season so naturally it is a bit disappointing for us," Farina said.

"Unfortunately, we were not able to come up with what was required and as a coach I can only ask the question of the Board of Directors. I totally respect their decision and we move on, it's as simple as that."

"Craig is a quality player; a good leader and would've been great for us, but if we can't do it, we can't do it. We still have that marquis spot open and we will continue to look for the right player to fill that gap," added the former national coach.

Farina has hinted that negotiations with non-marquee players were progressing well and that he was still in the hunt for a marquee signing.

"Sometimes you hit a few of these speed-bumps along the way and it's something that can happen to any club. We're no different, but the good thing is that we have other irons in the fire at the moment."

"We're having talks with a couple of players who I believe will be fantastic for us and bring both experience and depth to the squad. Hopefully we can bring these talks to a conclusion soon and concentrate on completing the balance of the squad," he said.

World Cup stars absent

Socceroos coach Graham Arnold has been able to pick just seven World Cup squad members for the international against Uruguay on June 2 at Sydney's Telstra Stadium.

Tim Cahill, Harry Kewell, Mark Viduka, John Aloisi, Mark Bresciano and Vince Grella headline the list of players unavailable.

Other Germany 2006 squad members missing through injury or in need of a rest are Mark Schwarzer, Craig Moore, Scott Chipperfield, Mark Milligan, Joshua Kennedy, Ante Covic and Josip Skoko.

While Zeljko Kalac, Tony Popovic and Stan Lazaridis have retired from international football.

Arnold explained that Cahill, Aloisi, Bresciano, Grella and Kennedy were not considered due to injury while it would be too much to ask Kewell to face Uruguay after being in Athens with Liverpool for this week's UEFA Champions League final.

The likes of Viduka, Schwarzer and Moore are in desperate need of a rest with Arnold confirming that he has given certain players a break so that they are available for the Asian Cup finals.

However, Moore and Kennedy are certain non-starters for the Asian Cup in July while Chipperfield may ask to be excused with his wife expecting a baby around the period of the tournament.

"It's great that we will have some experienced players like Lucas Neill, Brett Emerton, Jason Culina, Archie Thompson, Luke Wilkshire, Michael Beauchamp, and Mile Sterjovski to complement some exciting young players who will get to test themselves against some of the best players in the World," Arnold said.

"Our Asian Cup campaign starts here. We have a two-month program that starts now and we hope will result in success at our first Asian Cup."

"There is a significant amount at stake for the players who will be pushing for selection for the Asian Cup squad as this match against Uruguay will be the final game before the team is finalised."

Five players have been selected in the senior national team for the first time with goalkeepers Brad Jones and Adam Federici, defender Matthew Spiranovic and strikers Daniel Allsopp and Mark Bridge all hoping to make their debuts.

The 23-man squad will be reduced to 20 on match day.

Ancelotti's 'greatest victory'

Carlo Ancelotti has hailed his 'greatest victory' with AC Milan as his side beat Liverpool 2-1 in the Olympic stadium to lift the European Champions Cup for the seventh time.

Striker Filippo Inzaghi scored both Milan's goals, one in each half, and despite a late headed goal from Liverpool striker Dirk Kuyt, Milan were worthy winners in a tight match.

Ancelotti, whose job as Milan coach was under threat late last year, said: "This is an important victory because we did not lose sight of what we wanted to achieve."

"It's an extraordinary achievement. Very few fans expected us to win the most important trophy. Maybe no-one. But this is the greatest victory we've had."

Milan also owed their triumph to two saves from goalkeeper Dida, one from Jermaine Pennant in the first half and the other from Steven Gerrard in the second.

Ancelotti also revealed that, while he may have answered some of the critics who called for his head last November, he never contemplated leaving the club.

He added: "My market value has increased thanks to this victory, but my relationship with Milan is very strong."

"It's a very special relationship to me. I feel I belong to the Milan club. I played in this shirt, won important trophies in the shirt."

"I wasn't bothered about the rumours about someone replacing me in November. We just wanted to forget all the bad games which happened last August."

Ancelotti also hoped that the victory might paint Italian football in a brighter light following the corruption scandal which saw Milan start the season with an eight-point penalty in Serie A.

He said: "I wouldn't talk about revenge as regards the scandal. But Italian football and Milan suffered a lot."

"It is important for Italian football and we could become more serene because of this and get back some credibility."

Ancelotti admitted scoring first via Inzaghi's deflection from Andrea Pirlo's free-kick was crucial.

"That gave us confidence," added Ancelotti. "Before then we had few chances and few dangerous situations. We made more space in the second half."

"In the first half it was a difficult game. Liverpool attacked very strongly. There was a lot of pressure on our midfield. We couldn't get balls to Kaka and Seedorf."

"But we are a tough team. We played with attention and care and getting Ambrosini and Nesta fit was very important."

At the end Kaka slumped to his knees in the centre circle and prayed to the heavens while Inzaghi was enveloped in a sea of white shirts.

Inzaghi, who has now scored 38 Champions League goals, then revealed his first goal was a rehearsed move.

"I managed to do it against Empoli in the derby last year," he said. "Every now and again we manage to

pull it off. We rehearse it with the manager." "It's deeply rewarding for me, but most important was to win the cup. The coaches and the players work very closely together and it is great what we have achieved."

"We had to be careful. At 2-0 we felt euphoric but you should never lower your attention. Anything in football can happen, but we were glad it didn't happen tonight."

Sydney fall at last hurdle

Urawa Reds picked up the point they needed to progress to the quarter-finals of the AFC Champions League when they held Sydney FC to a scoreless draw at Saitama Stadium.

The point means the J-League champions finish ahead of the Australians at the top of Group E, joining compatriots Kawasaki Frontale in the last eight of the competition - the first time Japanese clubs have reached the knockout phase of the tournament.

Holger Osieck's side rarely looked like losing despite the even nature of the contest as Sydney failed to put the Reds defence under significant pressure throughout the 90 minutes.

As a result, Urawa go into the quarter-finals with an unbeaten record and they had the best chance in the opening half to take the lead.

That opportunity fell to Shinji Ono in the 17th minute when the former Feyenoord midfielder was picked out close to goal by Tomoyuki Soma's cross from the left, but the close-range volley looped over Clint Bolton's crossbar.

Sydney, though, were not overawed by the atmosphere inside the Saitama Stadium and within two minutes they fashioned a chance of their own when Alex Brosque sent his long-range effort just wide of the target.

With eight minutes remaining in the half, Brosque turned provider with an opportunity that should have seen the Australians take the lead.

The midfielder's cross from the right swung towards goal finding David Zdrilic unmarked between Urawa defenders, but the Sydney striker's header was poorly timed and the ball was comfortably collected by Ryota Tsuzuki.

Reds conjured up the best move of the half when Ono fed the ball through to Nene, whose deft touch found Washington, who in turn played Robson Ponte into enough space to fire off a shot that Bolton scrambled past the post for a corner.

The home side continued to press after the restart, with Ono going close four minutes into the second period.

Mark Milligan's volley from the edge of the area went over the bar just after the hour mark as Sydney continued to look for the goal they needed, but as time went on the Australians' lack of match sharpness started to tell.

David Carney's long-range attempt almost sneaked inside Tsuzuki's right post in the 67th minute, but from there the Australians presented little threat.

Indeed, Reds went close to sealing all three points in injury time when Washington had a strike at goal from just inside the area, but the Brazilian's effort was just wide of the target.
